About the Organization:

The Orange County Child Abuse Prevention Center is a non-profit organization that is committed to breaking the generational cycle of child abuse, while keeping family units intact. The Center recruits, trains, and supervises volunteers to work as in-home parent aids and assist families which are suspected of or at high risk of child abuse. The Center serves families through the following four approaches:  
- Volunteer Parent Mentor: A trained volunteer goes into the client's home to teach parenting skills, discipline techniques, organizational skills, budgeting, housekeeping, child-proofing, and to provide the parent with guidance and support.  
- Monitored Visitation Program: A trained volunteer assists staff in facilitation of visitation for families involved in child protective services.

About the Field Study Placement

Students are trained as volunteer parent-mentors and assist families who are suspected of or at high risk of child abuse. Students make weekly visits with their assigned clients, and model healthy, nurturing interactions with children. In addition, students will help parents to solve day-to-day problems and locate resources available in the community. A mandatory 16 hour training program is provided. Throughout their internship, field study students are included in the weekly supervisory sessions provided for psychology, B.S.W. and M.S.W. student interns.

Requirements

Genuine interest and willingness to assist at-risk families required. Students must be at least 21 years of age; a valid driver's license and auto insurance also necessary. An extensive background check - including fingerprinting and references.

The J.F. Shea Therapeutic Riding Center teaches horsemanship and horse management to disabled children and adults. The concept of the program is essentially that physical and psycho-social benefits are obtained through these horse-related activities. Therapeutic horseback riding is seen as a form of physical therapy (improving muscle coordination, strength, posture, and respiratory development), an educational activity, and a way to improve the social confidence and adjustment of the handicapped. Interns will have the opportunity to observe shelter operations and choose responsibilities that meet their education needs.

About the Organization:

The UCI Child Development Center is a site for a wide range of clinical trials and provides a variety of psychological services involving the assessment and treatment of adults, preschoolers, and elementary school-aged children and their families. Services offered include double-blind medication assessments, psycho-educational and neuropsychological testing of children and adults, and structured interviews with parents and teachers. Children who participate in these studies are predominantly those diagnosed with Attention Deficit Hyperactive Disorder (ADHD), although they may have other disruptive behavior disorders of childhood.

About the Field Study Placement

Academic year commitment required! Selected field study participants will be offered opportunities to observe, interact with and interview ADHD and normal control children and their parents. Training and supervision is provided on specific testing instruments such as the DSM-IV Diagnostic Interview Schedule for Children (DISC), the Wechsler Intelligence Achievement Test (WIAT), a computerized visual-perceptual orienting task, and several other cognitive tasks. Qualified and interested field study participants may be eligible to coordinate some of these testing and clinical activities including recruitment and telephone screening of volunteers to studies. Students will also be involved in data preparation, database entry and analysis, and will be trained on report generation. Students will be provided specific readings related to the training experiences in addition to independent library research for the individual project. Students will also be expected to attend regular, supervised meetings to discuss both theoretical and practical aspects of the project and to receive feedback on their performance on at least a weekly basis.

Requirements

Experience with school-aged children, ability to work well and responsibly with staff and patients, high level of motivation, professionalism and initiative, and the ability to maintain confidentiality are required for this field placement.
